- Resource reviews (up to 3500 words) are a significant component of the journal. Reader response research indicates that reviews are the most read section of a journal, so we intend to publish a significant number each year. The deadline for contributions to the 2000 issue of AJEE is 30 June. If you would like to submit an article but may need a little longer than 30 June, send Annette an e-mail giving her a submission date, and then negotiate!
