GENERAL INTRODUCTION

PROVENANCE

The material was donated by Lord Hylton in two instalments in 2014 and 2016.

BRIEF OUTLINE OF THE CAREER OF RAYMOND HERVEY JOLLIFFE, 5TH BARON HYLTON

Raymond Hervey Jolliffe was born on the 13th June 1932, the elder son of William George Hervey Joliffe, 4th Baron Hylton, and Perdita Rose Mary Joliffe (née Asquith), Lady Hylton. He was educated at Eton College, Windsor, Berkshire, and graduated from Trinity College, University of Oxford, with a history degree in 1955. Between 1960 and 1962 he served as Assistant Private Secretary to the Governor-General of Canada. He succeeded to the title of Baron Hylton in 1967.

Lord Hylton has been an independent (cross bench) member of the House of Lords since 1982. He was one of 92 hereditary peers elected to remain in the House of Lords after the passing of the House of Lords Act 1999. He is an active participator in parliamentary debate with a long-standing interest in conflict resolution, reconciliation and rehabilitation. He is a co-founder of the Ammerdown Centre, an ecumenical Christian retreat and conference centre in Somerset, committed to dialogue for improved relations between the world faiths and for peace building through non-violent methods.

For more than five decades Lord Hylton has worked with a broad range of national and international non-governmental and charitable organisations to protect human rights around the world. He has travelled widely, forming connections with communities in areas affected by military, political, religious and ethnic conflict. He has also served on a number of All-Party Parliamentary Groups to further his work and help shape relevant UK policy and legislation.

Lord Hylton's family landholdings are mainly in Somerset. He has always taken a keen interest in the surrounding area, engaging with local housing, farming and rural land management bodies as well as parish and district councils.

Lord Hylton is a member of the University of Bath Court.

DESCRIPTION OF THE COLLECTION

The material is presented in the order given in the contents list. It covers the period 1945 to 2013. As

far as possible the arrangement of the Collection follows the original order imposed by Lord Hylton.

The Collection includes a small amount of personal and biographical material but comprises mainly

correspondence, reports, working notes and briefing papers covering a range of topics associated with

Lord Hylton's work. These include peace building and mediation, religious freedom, international

criminal law, forced labour, refugees, asylum, domestic slavery, trafficking and prisons, as well as

individual cases of human rights infringement or violation.

The Collection contains material relating to Lord Hylton's interests in the UK, but is global in scope,

also documenting his involvement in international human rights enforcement and in developing

responses to dangerous or deteriorating situations in areas of persistent unrest such as

Israel/Palestine, Iraq, Chechnya, North Korea and Pakistan.

Lord Hylton's parliamentary activity - his questions, speeches and correspondence with MPs and fellow

members of the House of Lords - is well-represented. The Collection also contains material relating to

his collaboration with campaigning groups and other organisations, charities, politicians and religious

leaders in the UK and abroad.

Material relating to Lord Hylton's involvement in the Northern Ireland peace process is held by the

Institute of Irish Studies at the University of Liverpool.

SECTION B PARLIAMENTARY WORKING PAPERS B.1-B.75

This section contains working correspondence, papers, notes, draft speeches, briefings and press cuttings relating to a very wide range of local, national, international and global topics reflecting Lord Hylton's ongoing interests and activities in the House of Lords.

There is some overlap as Lord Hylton's in-depth work in connection with particular long-standing issues is also documented in other sections of the Collection. Subject areas covered in this section include, but are not limited to, apartheid, religious persecution, overseas students, immigration, agricultural policy, truancy and anti-social behaviour, the use of military mercenaries, adoption, Europe, climate change, hunting with dogs, piracy, Third World debt and education. Correspondents include MPs, government departments, fellow members of the House of Lords, charities and campaigners, ambassadors, religious groups, newspapers and private individuals.

Forming two series, the material covers the periods from 1977 to 1988 and from 1998 to 2012. The presentation is chronological and preserves as far as possible the filing system used by Lord Hylton.

SECTION C HUMAN RIGHTS

This section contains correspondence, reports, notes, newspaper cuttings and briefing papers relating to Lord Hylton's interest in human rights and his work as a member of the All-Parliamentary Human Rights Group. The material covers all aspects of human rights including slavery, religious freedom, torture and the use by UK authorities of information obtained by torture, international criminal law, forced labour, treatment of detainees and the death penalty, as well as individual cases of human rights infringement and violation. It is global in scope documenting Lord Hylton's involvement in international human rights enforcement and in developing responses to national situations in countries such as Iraq, Chechnya, Afghanistan, Nigeria, Nepal, Bulgaria, Philippines, North Korea and Pakistan.

Divided into a main general series with several accompanying country-specific series, the material dates from 1999 to 2010. Within each series the presentation is chronological and preserves as far as possible the filing system used by Lord Hylton.

SECTION D ASYLUM & REFUGEES

D.1-D.72

This section contains correspondence, reports, notes, newspaper cuttings, speeches and briefing papers relating to Lord Hylton's interest in asylum and refugees. In the 1980s Lord Hylton became a friend and supporter of the Medical Foundation for Victims of Torture. He was a signatory of Charter 87 for Refugees and has played an active role in parliamentary debate and in the formulation of governmental policy on immigration and asylum for decades.

The material covers topics including immigration removal centres, employment of refugees, prosecution of asylum seekers, treatment of unaccompanied children, migration, deportation and the long-term impact of detention on women and families. It documents Lord Hylton's involvement with various charitable organisations and local campaigning groups as well as the UK Border Agency (UKBA) and the Home Office.

Divided into a main general series with several smaller, accompanying, subject-specific series, the material dates from 1987 to 2011. The arrangement preserves as far as possible the filing system used by Lord Hylton.

SECTION G PRISONS & HOUSING G.1-G.73

This section contains correspondence, reports, speaking notes, working papers, minutes of meetings, press cuttings, briefings and conference circulars relating to Lord Hylton's work in the areas of prisons and housing.

Lord Hylton served on the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Penal Affairs and contributed to various other crossbench initiatives relating to the management of the UK's prison system. Material presented in this section covers a range of topics including prison buildings and construction, the treatment of prisoners, sentencing and prison terms, the employment of offenders, parole procedures, women detainees and childcare arrangements, purposeful activity, suicides and prisoner mental health. In addition, Lord Hylton took an interest in the personal circumstances of a number of prisoners. As a known advocate of fairness, understanding and reconciliation his support was sought by individuals and groups campaigning for justice in particular cases.

Lord Hylton was closely associated with the work of the Catholic Housing Aid Society (CHAS), serving as its honorary general secretary, and Shelter, as well as other housing organisations. Material presented in this section covers a range of topics including housing shortages, homelessness, overcrowding, multi-occupation, slums and their impact on families and family life, obsolete and inadequate housing, fair rents, affordable housing, home ownership, and legislation affecting mortgages, housing standards and council housing.
