Typical career pathways in psychology

- There are no typical career pathways, there is no single pathway. Career pathways can be confusing, do your research!
- Most mental health roles require further
 postgraduate training, research roles and
 professional bodies to ensure you are taking the
 accredited training.
- If you are interested in **clinical psychology**, you are strongly advised to gain voluntary or extra curricular experience within the social care / mental health field.
- If you are interested in occupational psychology, an awareness of how businesses and organisations operate is valuable.







Top Tips

- As a Psychology graduate you can work in many different roles, therefore it is vital that you research your career options and understand what you value in a job.
- **Find volunteering opportunities** in local charities such as Mind, Samaritans, Julian House, Genesis Trust and more
- Find extra curricular experience on campus such as with Student Minds, peer mentoring, Nightline
- Psychology graduates are successful in gaining business roles.
- **Network**, talk to people in roles you are interested in as there are many different job roles in both private/public sector.
- Tailor ALL your applications to the role. It is a very competitive field and organisations need people with skills that match their competencies.

Introduction

If you are studying Psychology you need not be constrained by the jobs listed in this leaflet. Many graduate employers in a broad range of businesses and organisations do not specify degree discipline, so you can look more widely. It
