New Policy Brief - End of life care in the UK ad Japan

In the past 12 months, <u>Dr Chao Fang</u> from the Centre for Death and Society and <u>Ms Miho Tanaka</u> from Japan Medical Associate Research Institute have been involved in an ERSC funded project 'End of life care in the United Kingdom and Japan - intersections in culture, practice and policy' (<u>the Mitori Project</u>). Both researchers have worked jointly to explore policy discourses regarding end of life care between England and Japan. The policy brief can be read <u>here</u>.

England and Japan are confronted with unprecedented challenges and opportunities in the face of population ageing and changing expectations about death and dying, which place heavy demands on health and social care systems. An in-depth analysis has been undertaken to compare a set of key policy documents and legislation implemented and enacted in both countries. This policy

brief summarises key findings from the analysis to report the commonalities and differences of end of life care, decision-making and bereavement support. Four key messages have been identified:

- 1) emphasising individualised care and support
- 2) improving care access and inclusion
- 3) supporting informal carers and family members
- 4) promoting integrated and holistic approaches

The policy brief aims to be valuable for academics, policy-makers, practitioners, as well as the general public. It paints a comparative picture of end of life care policies and laws between the two post-industrial and rapidly ageing societies. This comparison enables mutual understanding, aiming to inform and reshape future policy-making and legislation in both countries. Death in the Modern World - a new book by Tony Walters, CDAS

Death comes to all humans, but how death is managed, symbolised and experienced varies widely, not only between individuals but also between groups. What then shapes how a society manages death, dying and bereavement today? Are all modern countries similar? How important are culture, the physical environment, national histories, national laws and institutions, and globalization? This is the first book to look at how all these different factors shape death and dying in the modern world.

Written by an internationally renowned scholar in death studies, and drawing on examples from around the world, including the UK, USA, China and Japan, The Netherlands, Scandinavia and Eastern Europe. This book investigates how key

PABBS evidence-based and evaluated suicide bereavement training, has been informed by a three-year study, conducted by Dr. Sharon McDonnell and her team, at the University of Manchester, funded (£243K) by the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) and the first of its kind internationally.

This training will help those implementing:

- the suicide prevention strategy (locally, regionally and nationally);
- developing postvention services;
- NICE postvention guidelines in the community and custodial settings; and
- key objectives in the NHS Long term plan etc

- 17th November 2020

The research team have recently published three papers, which are directly associated with the PABBS training and are noted below (please click on blue text to take you to the article).

- 2 <u>Parents' Experiences</u> Parents bereaved by suicide experiences of support received from primary care
- 3. Evaluation Evaluation of PABBS Suicide Bereavement Training
