



Graduate Outcomes 2018/19 and 2019/20

Full-time UK domiciled first degree graduates - 15 months after Bath

The University of Bath has an excellent record of graduate employment, featuring in the top ten for graduate prospects in three major national league tables*. Across all subjects, 93% of Bath 2019/20 graduates who are employed in the UK are in high skilled employment, compared to 73% nationally. Hundreds of employers of all sizes and from all industries each year advertise vacancies, deliver presentations or network with our students; we are in the top 20 universities targeted by employers#.

The information shown here is from the Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) Graduate Outcomes survey for 2018/19 and 2019/20 leavers combined. It is the biggest UK annual social survey and captures the perspectives and current status of recent graduates, 15 months after leaving university.

Education with Psychology is a social science course that covers education, psychology, politics and sociology. Students can study the social and developmental contexts of childhood and youth in depth and develop the skills needed to positively impact young peoples' lives. Graduates from this course develop knowledge which can be applied to many complex real-life situations affecting childhood and youth such as education, mental health, and family life. As a result, graduates go on to a wide variety of different fields. Some choose to continue study and specialise in clinical or educational psychology; teaching or related roles is another common route, whilst others enter mental health, family outreach work or the charity sector.

Education with Psychology career pathways are varied, and graduates enter a range of sectors such as education, NHS, and healthcare and the charity sector.

The skills Education with Psychology graduates develop include enhanced analytical skills, research skills, critical thinking, and teamwork skills, which can be used in the public, private and third sector.

Occupations and job titles

Education with Psychology graduates progress into a variety of roles such as teaching and related support roles within education, mental health roles and some enter the private sector.

The vast majority of our UK employed Education with Psychology graduates are in high skilled employment. High skilled employment includes these three categories:
