Your Doctoral College

When you join the University we welcome you into our wider doctoral community and we have a range of activities that will enable you to engage within us.

We'll support you through each step of your doctoral journey, with professional advice and support, from when you first talk to us about coming to Bath until your graduation. Access to labs and offices

Some doctoral students are still working from home, with others in offices and labs on campus; we've also opened a number of University study spaces with social distancing measures. Once you're ready to begin your studies you should liaise with your supervisor on your plans to work remotely or come to campus.

Social distancing arrangements

Our spacious, green campus provides us with a range of opportunities to put on activities with social distancing measures in a safe way, and we have been able to offer a rich student experience beyond the formal curriculum. Our Sports Training Village was one of the first venues to reopen, under strict guidelines from Government and sporting bodies, with one-way systems and cleaning regimes needed.

Quarantine

Advice and support

Once you register with us you will have access to [support for your wellbeing and mental health](#), including Student Services, the [Students' Union](#), and our Doctoral Peer Support scheme.

[Student Services](#) provides students with a wide range of support and guidance, including: wellbeing, counselling and mental health support, money management, disability advice and support, and international student advice.

[The Disability Service](#) provides support for students with disabilities and/or long-term health conditions, which can include but are not limited to: specific learning difficulties (eg dyslexia), Autistic Spectrum Conditions, mobility or sensory impairments, and mental health conditions.

Peer mentoring

In most programmes you'll also be eligible for support from a [Peer Mentor](#) at the beginning of your studies; they'll give you informal advice about studying in Bath and share their experiences as a doctoral student.

Pure Genius

If you haven't taken a look already, don't forget to have a browse through [Pure](#), the University's research portal. Pure holds information about all of the research carried out at Bath, along with profiles of researchers, our organisational units, collaborations, projects and outputs. When you arrive, you will automatically be set up with your own Pure account, which you can add to throughout your time here. International students: language tests, visas and ATAS certificates

If you need a visa to study in the UK, you can read our latest [guidance from Student Immigration Services](#). If your offer letter indicates that the programme you intend to

study is covered by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS), then you will need to apply for an ATAS certificate.

It will take at least 20 working days for your ATAS application to be processed, and can take 30 days or more. Please apply for your certificate as soon as possible, in order to receive your clearance certificate in time for your visa application.
