1 Scope

- 1.1 These guidelines apply to new UK Postgraduate Taught (PGT) Masters students taking up a place of study in 2019-20 who are identified by the University as eligible for consideration for one of the PGT Bursaries. Applications for these bursaries are only open to those who hold an undergraduate honours degree from the University of Bath (including Integrated Masters as part of an undergraduate course, not a standalone Masters). Note that certain programmes are excluded from the funding awards including: Postgraduate Certificate, Diploma, CPD programmes and PhD programmes with an MRes (e.g. Integrated PhD, MRes/PhD).
- 1.2 These awards are made under the terms of the University's 2019-20 Access & Participation Plan. The allocation of funds is competitive and so not all applications received may be successful. There are up to 10 bursaries of £6,000 available to selected Home UK students who meet the eligibility criteria.

2 Terminology and definitions

- 2.1 A bursary is a cash award to assist with course-related costs. It will be paid to you in four instalments. You do not have to tell us how you are going to spend it.
- 2.2 Access & Participation Plan refers to the written statement of agreement the University has with the Office for Students. This document states in detail the fees the University is allowed to charge, the financial support it guarantees to make available to selected eligible students and the outreach activity the University agrees to undertake to support fair access. The University has more than one Access & Participation Plan/ Access Agreement because the nature of its support for students has changed over time. Your financial support arrangements are linked to the Access & Participation Plan for 2019-20 and these T&C's will apply for the duration of your studies. Any changes to the financial support framework introduced for later student cohorts will not be applied retrospectively to you. There is no guarantee that postgraduate students will be eligible for Access & Participation Plan funding in future years.
- 2.3 An eligible PGT programme is a full time or part time programme leading to an MSc, MA, MBA, or standalone MRes with a maximum duration of two years for a full time programme or four years for a part time programme. Part time programmes must be studied at a minimum of 50% intensity (e.g. a programme which would take one year if studied full time can take up to two years if studied part time). Programmes studied by distance learning are not eligible for this scheme.
- 2.4 Home (UK) students are those that are classed as Home (UK) (England, Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland), as assessed for fees purposes, as determined by Central Postgraduate Taught Admissions/
 School of Management. Students from the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man are not Home (UK) students according to this definition and are subject to 'Islands students' status.
- 2.5 Widening participation factors that we will consider in the selection process are defined in the following table:

Widening Participation (WP) Criteria			
Factor	Definition		
Low participation neighbourhood	This is a postcode classification which tells us what proportion of young people from your area progress to higher education. The specific system used is POLAR 3 data. This system groups postcodes into quintiles and quintile 1 or 2 counts as WP. This will be based on the postcode of your UK home address when taking your A Levels (or equivalent qualification). Where POLAR data is missing we will not be able to use any other proxy data or alternative classification system.		

High socio- economic disadvantage neighbourhood	Using the geodemographic segmentation tool, <u>Acorn</u> , we are able to gain an understanding of your socio-economic background. Acorn classifies neighbourhoods based on postcode and other demographic data, social factors, population and consumer behaviours. The system splits postcodes into <u>groups</u> . ACORN 4 or 5 counts as WP (excluding 4K). This will be based on the postcode of your UK home address when taking your A Levels (or equivalent qualification). Where ACORN data is missing we will not be able to use any other proxy data or alternative classification system.
Care Leaver	The Children (Leaving Care) Act 2000 definition states that a care leaver is someone 25 or under who has been in Local Authority Care for a period of at least 13 weeks or more since the age of 14 and who was in care on their 16th birthday. You will need to provide a letter from a social worker or Leaving Care Personal Adviser or other relevant professional confirming your care status. The University has a Student Retention & Success Adviser who can also provide you with additional support and advice during your studies.
Young Carer	You are classed as a <u>young adult carer</u> if you were a carer between the ages of 18 and 25 who looks after a relative or friend, of any age, due to disability, chronic/terminal illness, mental health problems or alcohol or drug addiction/dependency. You will need to provide a letter from a social worker or other relevant professional confirming your young carer status. The University has a <u>Student Retention & Success Advisor</u> who can also provide you with additional support and advice during your studies.
Irreconcilably Estranged	An <u>irreconcilably estranged</u> person is someone who has not had any verbal or written contact with their parents for a significant period of time (before the age of 25 for this funding scheme), and this is unlikely to change. This can include your biological or adoptive parents, or your only living parent. A significant period of time is usually considered to be twelve months or longer, but this can also depend on your circumstances. You will need to provide a letter from a social worker or other relevant professional confirming your estrangement status. The University has a <u>Student Retention & Success Adviser</u> who can also provide you with additional support and advice during your studies.
UK Refugee	 The definition of a refugee as defined on the UKCISA website is: (a) you must be <u>ordinarily resident</u> in England on the <u>first day of the first academic year of your course</u>; and (b) you must: have been recognised as a refugee by the UK Government and have remained ordinarily resident in the <u>UK and Islands</u> since then; or be the spouse / civil partner of such a refugee and have been in that relationship on the date on which he/she made his/her application for asylum; or be the <u>child</u> of such a refugee, or the child of such a refugee's spouse / civil partner, and be able to show that on the date that refugee made his/her application for asylum, you were: under 18 years of age; and

the refugee was your parent, or your parent's spouse / civil partner. We will require evidence of this if you have not already provided it as part of your application for study. The University has a Student Retention & Success Adviser who can also provide you with additional support and advice during your studies. To have been eligible for free school meals you or your family would have needed to be in receipt of a qualifying income-related welfare benefit e.g. income support, child tax credits, income based jobseekers allowance. **Free School Meals** EMA is a cash award given to students remaining in post 16 education who come from / Education low household income families. This allowance ceased to be in place in England in 2012. Maintenance Allowance (EMA) The 16-19 Bursary Fund replaced EMA in England and is a cash award which may be / 16-19 Bursary awarded to students remaining in post 16 education who come from low household Fund / Pupil income families. Premium / income Pupil Premium is funding allocated to a school on the basis of a child having ever been related under local authority care or qualified for free school meals. scholarship at a fee paying school We may also consider those who received an income related scholarship to attend a fee paying school, this is due to some of the funds, as above, not being available within this education sector and you would otherwise have qualified for one of the other payments above. Gender Your gender as disclosed in your application form for your programme of study. Your ethnicity as disclosed in your application form for your programme of study or **Ethnicity** subsequently in your bursary application.

3 Eligibility and Application

- 3.1 To be eligible to be considered for one of these bursaries, you need to:
 - o be a Home (UK) student; and
 - o apply for and subsequently register on an eligible PGT programme; and
 - o hold an undergraduate honours degree from the University of Bath; and
 - o submit your completed funding application, including a supporting statement by the deadline.
- 3.2 It is the University's responsibility to identify potential award recipients on the basis of these criteria but the University cannot be responsible for any errors or omissions in the information supplied to it and on which eligibility decisions are based. The University's decision on the interpretation of eligibility criteria is final and there is no right of appeal. You must comply with all requests for additional information to establish your eligibility within the timeframes specified and you must submit any evidence requested by any deadlines given.
- 3.3 You will not normally be eligible to apply for this bursary if you have received the PGT Bursary from the University for a previous period of study.
- 3.4 You should be aware that if you opt not to provide information relating to widening participation criteria, it may affect your eligibility to be considered for an award.
- 3.5 As part of the personal statement, applicants will need to demonstrate that they will be able to support themselves financially for the duration of their studies if awarded a Bursary.

- 3.6 Applicants who have received an offer to study and may be potentially eligible for this bursary award, will be contacted by email when applications open. Applications should be completed via your Bath Application Tracker. Please ensure that you keep your email address up to date in your Bath Application Tracker. Incomplete applications will not be considered.
- 3.7 Please note that if you apply for a place to study close to the bursary deadline then it is unlikely that you will be able to meet the bursary deadline. If you want to be able to apply for the bursary, then you need to make sure that you have submitted your application for study well in advance of the bursary closing date, ideally six weeks. This is to allow Central PGT Admissions/ School of Management to process your application, and for any documentation to be requested/reviewed that you may need to provide for your application to study. You will only be able to apply for the bursary if your application to study has been confirmed.
- 3.8 The deadline for bursary applications will be **Sunday 28 July 2019** at midnight (GMT).
- 3.9 The University reserves the right to review application closing dates to ensure the allocation of awards is met in full. However, we normally receive a high number of applications and so any deadline extension is unlikely.

4 Selection

- 4.1 PGT bursaries are discretionary. This means that even if you meet the relevant criteria to enable you to apply for one, you are not guaranteed one. The selection panel (as outlined below) will select the scholars it deems to be the most deserving in its sole discretion. Their decision in this respect is final and there is no right of appeal. In making their selection they will take into account the widening participation factors you have met as detailed, the supporting statement submitted in your funding application which includes financial viability and other contextual information, as provided in your application to study.
- 4.2 The selection panel will review your supporting statement alongside widening participation factors, in allocating this fund. The panel will normally comprise of the Academic Director of PGT Recruitment & Admissions, the Director of Undergraduate Admissions & Outreach, a senior academic and a representative from Student Services.
- 4.3 You cannot be considered for an award if you have not responded to our invitation to submit a funding application or provided any relevant supporting evidence, before the application deadline. All awards are discretionary and limited in number, so even if you meet the criteria you are not guaranteed to receive one.

5 Additional Funding Support

- 5.1 These funding schemes are normally only open to you if you are **not** in receipt of a scholarship or other sponsorship funding towards your fees and living costs. The University reserves the right to vary this policy in particular individual circumstances, where the additional funding received may be limited. The University reserves the right not to allocate, or to withdraw and seek repayment of your bursary, if you already have, or are later awarded a scholarship or sponsorship package.
- 5.2 Your eligibility for a bursary will not be affected by you taking out a UK government postgraduate loan.

6 Payments

Payment of awards will be made by the <u>University's Student Finance Office</u>. Please note your first bursary payment will only be paid to you on the due date if you have completed and returned a bursary payment agreement form which must be returned, **in person**, to the Student Finance Office in Wessex House 3.44. This form will be emailed to you should you be successful in your application.

The payment method will be by direct bank transfer. Bank details will need to be provided through your SAMIS account when requested otherwise payment will be delayed. Changes to bank details can be made through SAMIS at any time but will need to be made at least two weeks before a payment date to take effect.

Payment of the bursary award will be made over one year for full time students or two years for part time students.

Payment of the bursary award will be made in four instalments each year, usually: October, January, April and July.

The first payment of the award will be on or around 16 October 2019. Remaining instalments will be paid on or around 1st of the month, (normally earlier than 1st if this falls on a weekend / bank holiday).

6.2 If you are undertaking a full time PGT programme with a period of placement or which entails a longer period of study (e.g. 15 or 18 month programme), any award will be paid in full during the first 12 month period in four instalments.

7 Changes to study

7.1 If you change your programme or mode of study and are in receipt of an award which is for example programme/mode specific, it may be withdrawn. If you make **any** changes to your original programme of study you must notify the Scholarships & Bursaries Team about this, as it may affect your continued eligibility.

8 Suspensions and withdrawal from studies

- 8.1 If you suspend or withdraw from your studies then you will not be eligible to receive any future award payments in that year.
- 8.2 All bursary payments will be calculated on a pro rata basis and **any overpayments must be repaid** to the University should you suspend, withdraw from studies, or transfer to a non-eligible PG programme, or no longer be eligible for payments for any other reason, (in such a case the University may seek to recover the amount of the overpayment as a debt in the county court).
- 8.3 Following a period of suspension, you may be eligible to receive any outstanding awards due upon your return to studies. Awards in these circumstances will be calculated on a pro rata basis.

9 Repeating, extending or deferring your studies

- 9.1 Awards will not be paid during any extension/repeat period(s) to your taught postgraduate programme.
- 9.2 Awards are allocated for 2019 entry only. If you defer or withdraw and restart, any award already offered will become void. If eligible, you will be considered for support the following year, but this will be subject to the terms of the Access & Participation Plan and any funding provision then in force. There is no guarantee that postgraduate students will be eligible for funding in future years.

10 Disciplinary action and fraudulent applications

10.1 The University reserves the right to withdraw an award from anyone who is found to have misled the University about any aspect of their eligibility and to seek repayment of any monies already paid to them. In such cases the University may seek to recover any money paid as a debt in the county court (in which case it may also seek to recover additional sums such as interest, court fees and legal costs). We may request at any point, for audit purposes, evidence of any widening participation criteria as stated in your application.

11 Alumni Discount

11.1 If you are eligible for the 10% alumni discount, separate terms and conditions apply for this discount. You should refer to this guidance on the University web pages. Being awarded a bursary will not affect your eligibility for the alumni discount.

12 Appeals

12.1 The University's decision on the interpretation of eligibility criteria is final and there is no right of appeal. You may make a complaint if you believe that you have not been considered for an award because of a procedural error, or you believe that there has been some other procedural problem with our allocating and awarding system. Complaints should be made under the terms of our Admissions Complaints and Review Procedure. You must comply with all requests for additional information to establish your eligibility within the timeframes specified and you must submit any evidence requested by the stated deadlines.

13 Use of Data

In addition to the University <u>privacy and cookie policy</u>, the University may use the widening participation (WP) data / information you share with us to provide information and advice about the University to you as an applicant. Should you subsequently join the University, the University may also use the data to inform our strategies for supporting you as a new entrant, to inform you about provision that you may be able to access, to monitor student success and for other legitimate reasons. Refer to our web pages for our <u>data protection policies</u>. We may also use your data in the allocation of other scholarships on offer from the University and in partnership with corporate donors where funding may be allocated based on your widening participation factors as defined in these guidelines. Your actual widening participation data will not be shared with a third party but shortlisting/ selection for a scholarship may give an indication that you have met any such factors.
